#### **PagesofHistory**

October 1, 1919 - the opening of the **Novgorod Institute of Public Education**, created on the basis of male and female teachers'seminaries and the Sedletsk Teachers' Institute, transferred to Novgorod from the Lublin province of Polandduring the Civil War.

The institute began to work in Antonovo, in the building of a former theological seminary.

In 1922 the name of the institute was changed to the **Practical Institute of Public Education**.

In 1922, **Practical Institute of Public Education**released the first graduation in the amount of 37 people.

On the 10<sup>th</sup> of July, 1923, by the decree of the Council of People's Commissars of the RSFSR, practical institutions of public education, including Novgorod, were transformed into pedagogical technical schools.

In September 1932 the **Novgorod State Pedagogical Institute named after M.N. Pokrovsky**with the departments of history, Russian language and literature, physics and mathematics and natural geography was established. However, the educational institution retained this status only for two years.

On the 1<sup>st</sup>of September1934 the Novgorod State Teachers' Institute with the Faculty of History and the Faculty of Russian Language and Literature appeared. The Physics and Mathematics Faculty was transferred to Pskov, the Natural Geography Faculty was transferred to Leningrad.

October, the 31st, 1936 - in accordance with the instructions of the People's Commissariat of Education "On the educational work of teachers' institutes", pedagogy, psychology, military affairs, history of the ancient world, history of the Middle Ages, methods of teaching history, linguistics, folklore, ancient literature, Russian literature were studied according to unabridged programs of pedagogical institutes of the XVIII century.

In August 1941, Novgorod was abandoned by the Soviet troops. The teachers' training in the institutewas interrupted.

August the 19<sup>th</sup>, 1945 - an order of the Council of People's Commissars of the RSFSR on the restoration of the **Novgorod State Teachers' Institute** in the city of Borovichi (Novgorod Region) was issued.

October the 1st, 1945 - classes began at the institute.

On the basis of the Resolution of the Council of Ministers of the USSR No. 3692 of August 11, 1952 and the Resolution of the Council of Ministers of the RSFSR of August 19, 1952, the Novgorod State Teachers' Institute was transferred to Novgorod and reorganized into the **Novgorod State Pedagogical Institute** (NSPI), which provided higher pedagogical education.

This is how the work of the Novgorod State Pedagogical Institute began.

In 1956 on the basis of the historical circle, a student scientific society (SSS) was created, the first conference of which was held in 1957.

Since 1956 - annual intra-university scientific-theoretical conferences were held, four volumes of "Scientific notes of the Novgorod State Pedagogical Institute" were published.

1959 - the All-SovietNekrasov Conference was held on the basis of the NSPI. By 1969, the NSPI had four faculties and trained teachers in nine specialties.

In April 1972, the Novgorod State Pedagogical Institute was headed by Mikhail Ivanovich Kulikov, who remained the head of the institute for 13 years. The period of his leadership was the heyday of the Novgorod Pedagogical Institute.

NSPI became the leading institute among pedagogical universities of the Center and North-West of Russia on the problems of generalizing the experience of the rural schools.

In October 1971, the scientific and pedagogical club "We are Sukhomlintsy" opened at the Department of Pedagogy.

In 1972 the University of Pedagogical Knowledge began to operate for teachers of Novgorod.

In 1974 a regional archaeological student conference of universities in the northwestern and central regions of Russia was heldin NSPI.

In 1974 the Novgorod State Pedagogical Institute entered the second category of the country's universities.

1976-77 academic yearstudent pedagogical teams and student construction teams were established.

1979 - Novgorod State Pedagogical Institute was awarded the Certificate of Merit by the Presidium of the Supreme Soviet of the RSFSR for great services in training pedagogical personnel and in connection with its 60th anniversary.

1982 - the All-Russian meeting of rectors of pedagogical universities, directors of secondary pedagogical educational institutions and heads of public education authorities was held in NSPI to discuss the Joint activities of pedagogical universities, schools and public education bodies to improve the quality of teacher training.

Based on the results of its work in 1982, the Institute was awarded the Red Banner of the RSFSR Council of Ministers and the All-Union Central Trade Union Council.

From the 1988/89 academic year, the institute switched to new curricula, which expanded the rights of academic councils and departments in the organization and content of training. Traditional lectures began to give way to problematic and generalizing ones, giving recommendations for in-depth study of the course, business games and discussion classes were used.

Since 1992, the NSPI had to move to a multilevel structure of education. The competent commission concluded that the institute as a whole complies with the system providing for the introduction of bachelor's and master's degrees.



#### Present time

At present, Institute of Continuous Pedagogical Education is training bachelors and masters in 4fields of education:

<u>"Pedagogical education"</u> (bachelor's profiles: technology and informatics; English and German; fine arts and additional education: arts and crafts; primary education and additional education: extracurricular work; physical culture; preschool education. Master's profiles: educational management; management and digitalization of technological education; physical culture and sports; Orthodox culture in modern education; education in the field of physical culture and sports; literary education),

<u>"Psychological and pedagogical education"</u> (bachelor's profiles: social pedagogy and psychology, inclusive psychology and pedagogy; master's profiles: psychology and pedagogy of inclusive education, management of education),

"Special (defectological) education" (bachelor's profile: speech therapy; master's profile: education of persons with intellectual development problems),

"Psychology" (Master'sprofile: socialdevelopmentalpsychology).

Students enrolled in the areas of "Pedagogical Education" and "Psychological and Pedagogical Education" have the opportunity to take part in the international educational project "Double Degree" and receive a diploma from the University of Hildesheim (Germany) along with a Russian diploma.

The Dissertation Council has been successfully working at the Institute for more than 20 years organizing the defense of dissertations for the degree of Doctor and Candidate of Pedagogical Sciences in the following scientific specialties: "General Pedagogy, History of Pedagogy and Education", "Theory and Methods of Professional Education".

For many years, Institute of Continuous Pedagogical Education has been actively developing international relations with universities in Austria, Belarus, Germany, Latvia, Ukraine, Sweden and the United States, within the framework of which joint educational projects are developed with the participation of faculty, graduate students and students, providing an opportunity to improve their qualifications, study and work in foreign universities.
