1 Goals and Objectives of the course (module) Russian Speech Culture

The purpose of the course is to give international students who haven't studied Russian language earlier some necessary amount of knowledge sufficient for the general application of Russian as a foreign language within the waystage level, and to prepare the international students for a faster adaptation in the new socio-cultural environment.

Objectives:

- a) to ensure the acquisition of the following stills
- the skill of understanding the situation and successfully reacting in a situation of communication, knowing how to communicate successfully.
- the skill of communication by the means of speech within the basic level and corresponding topics.
- the skill of presenting a monologue or dialogue speech according to the norms of the modern Russian language, including generally recognized models conditioned by the social norms.
 - b) to contribute to the students' general development in the follow ways:
- by stimulating students to study different types, forms, models of communication and its components.
- by developing cultural empathy and the capacity to correctly interpret all sorts of communicative behavior.
- c) to clarify their understanding of what is considered to be 'good manners' within the given culture:
- informing students on particulars of local communicative strategies in different social circles or social spheres.
- developing the capacity for the tolerant attitude towards other cultures and their representatives.

2 The Integration of the Course in the Undergraduate Curriculum

The course (module) is a subject belonging to the core part/ part formed by the participants of educational relations of the basic professional educational program curriculum of specialty 31.05.01 General Medicine /31.05.03 Dentistry and field (profile) General Medicine / Dentistry (hereafter – BPEP). Any previously formed competencies of students are not required – it is a course for complete beginners. Proficiency in the subject is a competence resource for further general studies and a necessary tool for communication while in the country.

3 Learning Outcomes of the course (module) Russian Speech Culture

The list of competencies that are developed in the process of mastering the course includes:

5 Recommendations for Mastering the Course (Module) Russian Speech Culture

Methodological recommendations for the organization of the course "Russian Speech Culture"

These guidelines establish the order and method of studying the theoretical and practical material of the course. Guidelines are made for each type of training work that is included in the course. Guidelines should direct the student to creative unaided work, should not replace educational literature and reference books, give ready-made solutions to the tasks that are set before the student.

Almost all grammatical material is intended for active learning at the beginning, which is due to the leading role of oral speech at the initial stages of learning. Then the grammatical material should be activated in the speech of students, and the rest of the material is intended for passive assimilation, which is associated with increasing the role of the student and introductory reading. The texts in the beginning are based on neutral language material. The rest of the lessons include original and adapted works of art. Texts vary in volume and difficulty level. This allows the teacher to vary the teaching methods depending on the level of the students.

The final evaluation mark is given according to the following scale:
